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Part I. Grant sources for purchasing conservation land and interests in land

This list includes the federal, state, local, and private sources of funds that are most commonly used in NH to purchase interests in real estate for conservation. Review the funding source's web link for up-to-date information about availability, eligibility, match requirements, grant cycles, and priorities, or contact the organization directly.
